Welcome letter

Dear friends and supporters,

In 2024, we made steady progress toward our vision of a Europe where no child goes missing without a trace. AMBER Alert Europe worked across borders and disciplines to raise awareness, improve investigative tools, and build stronger networks that support the protection of missing children. These efforts reflect the shared commitment of all those who stand behind this cause.

At the heart of our work is a growing and dedicated network. Today, AMBER Alert Europe connects 75 participating organisations across 29 countries, including Ministries of Interior, police academies, NGOs, and universities. These partnerships make it possible to respond more quickly, share vital knowledge, and ensure that no disappearance is limited by geography or procedure.

One of the key highlights of the year was the launch of Check. Think. Report., a prevention campaign that reached families in 16 countries and 14 languages. Designed with input from law enforcement experts, it provides clear steps for parents and caregivers to follow when a child goes missing—offering guidance in moments when every second matters.

We also saw important developments at the policy level. Through our advocacy efforts, the Prüm II Regulation and the AI Act were updated to include missing persons. These changes support the use of biometric identification and real-time data sharing—tools that can play a crucial role in accelerating investigations and providing answers to families in need.

The International Cold Case Analysis Project (ICCAP) continued to thrive, connecting over 1,000 students, professionals, and law enforcement experts from 53 police academies and universities from 12 countries. Together, they examined long-unsolved cases with fresh insight, reinforcing the value of combining academic research with practical expertise.

As we look ahead to 2025, we are undertaking critical, first-of-its-kind research to gather real-world data that will provide a comprehensive picture of the many factors surrounding why and how children go missing, what happens in the critical moments afterward, and how we can strengthen prevention and response systems. This foundational work is essential to identifying root causes and closing the gaps that put children at risk. Every new collaboration, every data point, and every shared insight brings us closer to a future where children are not only found, but truly protected.

What we achieved in 2024



Working Together for Zero Missing Children: AMBER Alert Europe's Impact in 2024

In 2024, AMBER Alert Europe continued its efforts to improve the protection of missing children across Europe. Working together with partners at national, crossborder, and EU levels, the Foundation contributed to meaningful progress through advocacy, awareness campaigns, research collaborations, and operational initiatives. Each of these efforts brought us a step closer to our goal of zero missing children ensuring that more children are found, more families are supported, and fewer disappearances go unanswered.

Our 2024 Highlights

SUPPORTING FAMILIES THROUGH AWARENESS AND PREPAREDNESS

In recognition of International Missing Children's Day, we launched the Check. Think. Report. campaign in 16 countries, made available in 14 languages to reach families across diverse linguistic and cultural backgrounds. Developed in close collaboration with law enforcement experts, the campaign focused on providing parents and caregivers with clear, accessible guidance on what to do in the critical first moments when a child goes missing. Rather than overwhelm with information, the materials were designed to be simple, actionable, and reassuring—offering structure in a moment often defined by panic and uncertainty.

While the circumstances of each disappearance are different, helping families feel more informed and prepared is an important step in strengthening society's overall ability to respond to missing children cases.





ADVANCING POLICY TO INCLUDE AND PROTECT THE MISSING

In 2024, important steps were taken at the EU level to better address the issue of missing persons in key legislation. We worked closely with Members of the European Parliament, EU agencies, and other partners to ensure that missing persons were included in both the Prüm II Regulation and the Artificial Intelligence Act.

These changes help improve how countries share information, use biometric data, and apply AI tools in missing person investigations. While further work is needed to put these changes fully into practice, their inclusion in EU law is an important move toward stronger and more coordinated responses across Europe.

ADDRESSING LEGAL GAPS AND PROMOTING A UNIFIED EU RESPONSE

We continued our work with European policymakers to improve how missing children are protected across the EU. As part of this effort, we participated in discussions with the European Parliament's LIBE (Civil Liberties, Justice and Home Affairs) and JURI (Legal Affairs) Committees, calling for a more consistent, child-focused approach at the European level.

Currently, the way missing children cases are handled can vary greatly between countries, especially in cross-border situations. To help close these gaps, we highlighted the need for mutual recognition of risk assessments—so that when a child is considered at high risk in one country, that status is recognised across borders. We also stressed the importance of equal protection for all missing children, regardless of whether their case is linked to a crime.

A key part of our message was the proposal to create a European Centre for Missing Persons. This centre would support better cooperation and coordination between national authorities and help ensure that every missing child in Europe is treated with urgency and care. The proposal reflects our ongoing goal: to build a Europe where missing children do not fall through the cracks and where protection is not limited by borders.

INNOVATING COLD CASE INVESTIGATIONS THROUGH ICCAP

In 2024, our International Cold Case Analysis Project (ICCAP) continued to grow as a unique initiative combining academic knowledge with practical investigation. More than 1,000 students and professionals from 53 organisations in 12 countries took part, working together to explore new ways of looking at long-unsolved missing persons cases. With participants from diverse fields—such as law, criminology, forensic science, and psychology— ICCAP encourages fresh perspectives and critical thinking.

One highlight of the year was the Dutch Police Hackathon, where an ICCAP team helped identify two possible missing persons in an active case. While outcomes like these remain exploratory, they show the potential of combining education and investigation.

More than just a project, ICCAP is a growing collaboration between universities, police, and other partners across Europe. It shows how working together in new ways can bring renewed attention and new hope—to cold cases that might otherwise remain in the dark.





STRENGTHENING CROSS-SECTOR PARTNERSHIPS

Last year, we continued to grow our network of partners committed to protecting missing children. Strengthening collaboration across different fields—such as academia, law enforcement, and civil society—remained an important focus. A formal agreement with the University of Cologne laid the foundation for joint training activities and academic research on child protection, highlighting the value of combining knowledge with practical application.

We also welcomed the French organisation AVANE to our network. With its experience in unresolved disappearances, AVANE is supporting efforts to review and analyse cold cases. These new partnerships reflect our ongoing commitment to working together across borders and sectors, helping us move closer to our shared goal of better protecting children and preventing disappearances.

SUPPORTING LAW ENFORCE-MENT THROUGH TRAINING

We strengthened our cooperation with CEPOL, the EU Agency for Law Enforcement Training, by entering into a new multi-year framework agreement. This formal agreement builds on years of trusted collaboration, aimed at supporting law enforcement professionals in their essential work on missing person cases. Over the past four years, we have hosted nine expert-led training sessions on various aspects of missing person investigations. Through this continued partnership, we remain committed to working alongside law enforcement-supporting their efforts with resources, networks, and opportunities for knowledge sharing.

AMBER Alert Europe, the European Centre for Missing Children, is a foundation that strives to improve the protection of missing children and to prevent children from going missing by empowering them and raising awareness on the issue of missing children and its root causes. We connect experts from 75 participating organisations, particularly Ministries of Interior, civil society, universities, and police academies from 29 countries, in our mission towards zero missing children in Europe

Our activities

Our activities cover training, research, child alerting, and prevention and awarenessraising, as well as launching initiatives aimed at impacting policies and legislation in the area of children's rights. Our joint efforts with police experts in the field of missing children even paved the way for a European police expert network in this area.

All of our activities are implemented in line with the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights and the EU Strategy on the Rights of the Child and with respect for the privacy of children and data protection laws.

Our beginnings

As a response to missing children cases exceeding geographical borders, the AMBER Alert Europe Foundation was founded in 2013 to contribute to better cross-border coordination and cooperation in the search for missing children.

Since then, our network has expanded and now encompasses different experts from a variety of backgrounds who make their know-how and expertise available to improve existing practices and procedures for a fast and safe recovery of missing children and safeguarding of children against going missing or an abduction.

3.3 Notes to the financial statements

General notes

Activities

The activities of Stichting AMBER Alert Europe, having its registered office at Beek primarily consist of:

- Stichting AMBER Alert Europe, having its registered office at Peter Treckpoelstraat 4, 6191 VK Beek, The Netherlands, aims to contribute, on the one hand, to the protection of missing persons in Europe, particularly missing children due to their vulnerability, and on the other hand, to the prevention of disappearances in Europe by undertaking activities that contribute to this goal in any way possible and by carrying out all that is related or conducive to the aforementioned objectives.

The foundation seeks to achieve this goal by:

a. overcoming barriers in terms of bureaucratic, legal, geographical, or linguistic boundaries. With a view to this objective, the foundation will seek cooperation with organizations that pursue the improvement of safety within European society.

b. promoting the involvement and participation of relevant governmental and non-governmental organizations, businesses, and civil society to achieve its objective.

c. supporting national or international police organizations and encouraging cooperation between them for the aforementioned goal.

d. facilitating and organizing education and training on the subject of missing persons, especially missing children, and closely related topics for a wide range of stakeholders and actors.

e. engaging in activities focused on prevention and increasing public awareness regarding the subject of missing persons, especially missing children, and closely related topics.

f. conducting research on the subject of missing persons, particularly missing children, and closely related topics.

g. upon request from national authorities, contributing to the implementation of an AMBER Alert system and other forms of citizen participation in European member states, or connecting these or similar systems. h. launching initiatives aimed at influencing legislation and legal processes in the field of children's rights and other relevant regulations.

i. carrying out all further actions that are broadly related to or conducive to the aforementioned, provided that the foundation operates independently, neutrally, and based on expertise and evidence.

Registered office, legal form and registration number at the chamber of commerce

3.3 Notes to the financial statements

General accounting policies

General

The financial statements are prepared according to directive RJk.C2 "Kleine fondsenwervendeorganisaties". The Annual Report has been prepared in accordance with directive RJ650 "Fondswervende organisaties van de Raad voor de Jaarverslaggeving".

The annual accounts have been prepared based on the historical cost. Valuation of assets and liabilities and determination of the result takes place under the historical cost convention.

Given that the budget of this foundation is not used as an important steering tool for controlling the activities, the differences between the budget and the balance aren't analyzed.

Comparison with previous year

The valuation principles and method of determining the result are the same as those used in the previous year, with the exception of the changes in accounting policies as set out in the relevant sections.

Exceptional items

Exceptional items are items of income and expense from the normal, non-incidental activities or transactions, but which need to be disclosed separately on the basis of the nature, size or incidental character of the item.



3.3 Notes to the financial statements

ACCOUNTING POLICIES APPLIED TO THE VALUATION OF ASSETS AND LIABILITIES

Tangible fixed assets

Other tangible fixed assets are valued at historical cost or production cost including directly attributable costs, less straight-line depreciation based on the expected future life and impairments.

Accounts receivable

Receivables are initially valued at the fair value of the consideration to be received, including transaction costs if material. Receivables are subsequently valued at the amortised cost price. Provisions for bad debts are deducted from the carrying amount of the receivable.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand represent cash in hand, bank balances and deposits with terms of less than twelve months. Overdrafts at banks are recognised as part of debts to lending institutions under current liabilities. Cash at bank and in hand is carried at nominal value.

Reserves and funds

When the foundation purchases treasury shares, the consideration paid is deducted from other reserves or any other reserve if the articles of association allow so) until the shares are cancelled or reissued. Where such shares are subsequently reissued, any consideration received is included in other reserves or any other reserve. The consideration received will be added to the reserve from which earlier the purchase price has been deducted.

Incremental costs directly attributable to the purchase, sale and/or issue of new shares are shown in reserves and funds as a deduction, net of tax, from the proceeds.

Current liabilities

On initial recognition current liabilities are recognised at fair value. After initial recognition current liabilities are recognised at the amortised cost price, being the amount received, taking into account premiums or discounts, less transaction costs. This usually is the nominal value.



3.3 Notes to the financial statements

PRINCIPLES FOR THE DETERMINATION OF THE RESULT

General

The result is the difference between the realisable value of the goods/services provided and the costs and other charges during the year. The results on transactions are recognised in the year in which they are realised.

Costs

Costs are determined on a historical basis and are attributed to the reporting year to which they relate.

Exceptional items

Exceptional items are items of income and expense from the normal, non-incidental activities or transactions, but which need to be disclosed separately on the basis of the nature, size or incidental character of the item for reasons of analysis and comparability of the results.

Financial income and expense

Interest income and interest expenses

Interest income and expenses are recognised on a pro rata basis, taking account of the effective interest rate of the assets and liabilities to which they relate. In accounting for interest expenses, the recognised transaction expenses for loans received are taken into consideration.

Currency translation differences

Currency translation differences arising upon the settlement or conversion of monetary items are recognised in the income statement in the period that they are realised, unless hedge accounting is applied.
